Call to Order	The meeting was called to order by Karen Haslam at 6:30p.m.
Welcome & Introductions	Karen Haslam welcomed all present followed by Eleanor reading the Land Acknowledgement and the Human Rights Statements.

#### **Land Acknowledgement**

- the process. The event was held on Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup>. Over 25 colleges/universities were involved and all grade 12s were present. As a follow up, Application Seminars will also be held.
- Teacher Caregiver Interviews Oct. 20 (4-7p.m.) and Oct. 24 (12-2p.m.), 5-minute sessions. If more time is required, it is recommended that a separate appointment be scheduled for a more in-depth conversation. Whilst it was a Board decision to have 2 sessions, PHS staff agreed to give extra 1 hour, as typically only 4 hours total.
- Kiss and Ride Concerns Administration has met 2 councillors from Town of Ajax, spoke with Lincoln Alexander's principal and By-Law officers about the issues. Bylaw will be issuing tickets over a fixed period. The school will be issuing a message about appropriate drop off and is also highly recommending that students walk to school, where possible.
- Bus cancellation— DSTS controls buses school has no control we however recognize the inconveniences when abruptly cancelled. The main challenge currently is due to driver shortage.
- o Grade 11 students made a presentation to staff as it relates to Indigenous Issue, for example, should stand for land acknowledgement similar to anthem. This will be further assessed and see how to proceed as a school. Currently students have the option of not standing for the anthem (Students' Rights Policy). This comes on the heals of the mandatory indigenous study starting this year
- SPONSORSHIP OPG is sponsoring Robotics club for \$2,500. This club is overseen by Ms. Nair.
- Academic Honesty Guideline put off for next meeting

- OSSLT Update The test will be held on Dec 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup>. Bell times will change for that date. Accommodation is given for all students. This is a test of Grade 9 literacy assessment. PHS has historically had an 88-90% success rate. Prep sessions/tests will be held for 4 weeks in Oct. Additional material can also be found at online. Passing grade is 75%, i.e., 300 out of 400.
  - For those with a grade below 270 (IEP needs), instead of re-doing the test, there is the option of the Ontario Literacy Course which provides both a school credit plus the OSSLT pass.
- MARK REPORTING Mr. Phelon advised that digital Progress Reports will be sent by the school on Nov 17<sup>th</sup> on Parent Portal. Final report card will be issued on February 16, 2023.
