



The Diplôme d'études en langue française (**DELF**) is an internationally recognized test of French proficiency, laid out by the French Ministry of National Education and Youth. It tests students' ability to use French in real-life situations, and is based on the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFRP). Proficiency is measured across four competencies: [listening](#), [speaking](#), [reading](#), and [writing](#). Successful candidates receive a [diploma that is valid for life](#). This diploma can be used worldwide for [education and employment purposes](#).

Who can take the DELF? How much does it cost?

Any DDSB student who has enrolled in a [Grade 12 FSL](#) course this academic year (either Core or Immersion), and who has not previously written the DELF. The DDSB, in its efforts to promote French language learning, [pays the cost of the DELF](#) for our students.

How do students choose their testing level?

Each student is responsible for selecting the level of proficiency that suits them best: [A2](#), [B1](#), [B2](#). Samples of the various levels of testing are available online, via the [DELF Spring Google Classroom](#). (code: 22boeym)

How do students sign up?

If interested in participating, students must register via [Google Form](#), which is located in the [PHS Spring DELF Google Classroom](#) while logged in on their [DDSB](#) account.

Registration: from Feb 24th to 4pm March 9th

Testing: [April 24](#) to [May 05](#) at Durham District School Board Office in Whitby. Students will be assigned dates and times for testing; special requests can generally not be accommodated, due to the large number of participants. Students are responsible for organizing their own transportation.
